Mass times Sacrament of Reconciliation and Penance Confessions: Sundays 9.15am-9.45am, Saturdays 9.45 am -10.15 am during Holy Hour, and after every weekday Mass or by appointment Sacrament of Confirmation – annual course for baptised young Catholics – please apply to Fr Peter **Sacrament of Marriage –** please speak to Fr Peter at least six months before the proposed wedding date. Sacrament of Healing - It is our duty to call a priest to anoint family members in failing health. Please try to give notice if at all possible and don't leave it to the last minute. It brings consolation to the dying as well as healing to the sick. It can be administered at church, in hospital, care home, at home, indeed anywhere. Make sure you are anointed before an operation with general anaesthetic. 

NEXT SUNDAY COLLECTION FOR ST GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL

THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS IS A HISTORICAL FACT SPIRITUALLY IT BRINGS US TRUE PEACE AND GOD'S MERCY

The scriptural passages in this Easter Season tell us of the early appearances of Jesus risen from the dead. He first appears to the women. They had come as soon as it was permitted for them to anoint the body of Jesus which had been buried in great haste as the Sabbath began on the evening of Good Friday. The Scriptures tell us, therefore, that the women were the first messengers of Christ's resurrection to the apostles (CCC 641 ff). Crucially, the apostles did not believe the women. Some people then and now say that the apostles and all the disciples, male and female, had been so traumatised by the crucifixion of Christ (and their feelings of guilt at their lack of courage in scattering and denying Christ) that through post-traumatic stress and hysteria they jumped at the idea that Christ had risen from the dead. But it was not and is not an idea. The apostles needed a lot of persuading to believe that Christ had risen from the dead. These were solid, normal, down-to-earth and trustworthy men and women, who, though traumatised, had healthy doubts about the very possibility of resurrection, even though they had been told several times by Jesus that he would rise from the dead, and even though they had witnessed Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead. Initially the apostles did not believe the women's eye witness account of the risen Christ and rejected it as an "idle tale."

Even when Christ first appeared to them, we are told in the Gospels that they thought they had seen a ghost. Christ reassures them and asks them to touch him. In Luke's Gospel he even asked for something to eat and they gave him broiled fish which he ate. But he also rebukes them for their unbelief in Mark's Gospel and for failing to heed what he had been telling them several times as they accompanied him on his mission. We hear how Jesus then opened their minds to the Old Testament Scriptures, that they had to be fulfilled, that the Christ must suffer terribly and die before then rising from the dead on the third day. The resurrection is a historical fact. Christ's body was truly physical though no longer earthly. He could pass through locked doors, disappear at will and defy time and space and the laws of nature (CCC 646, 659). In today's reading from John's Gospel the risen Jesus shows the apostles his wounds and his first words are **"Peace be with you."** This is a calm and peaceful resurrection with the very special peace of Christ. As pope Benedict explains, "the wounds of the risen and glorious Lord are the permanent sign of God's merciful love for humanity. From them flows a spiritual light that enlightens consciences and pours into hearts comfort and hope." The apostles' encounter with the risen Christ exuded love, hope, forgiveness and mercy – and great patience as he later appeared to Thomas who would not believe until he had felt the physical wounds of Christ – "My Lord and my God."
