RESURRECTION! WE ARE THE EASTER PEOPLE JOYFULLY ACCOMPANIED BY THE RISEN CHRIST WE ARE LIKE THE TWO DISCIPLES ON THE ROAD TO EMMAUS IN THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

We are all on the road to Emmaus one way or other as we meditate on today's famous passage from the Gospel of Luke about the RISEN CHRIST (Luke 24:13-35). The road to Emmaus is the journey of life, the real Chessington world of adventures, the rollercoaster of faith, of trusting and entrusting oneself to God, of taking a risk for Christ. Paraphrasing St Anselm, we have faith but we are constantly seeking understanding. We need the Holy Spirit to bring us to Christ, to explain everything to us so that we may believe and be saved. And in believing, we are reborn into a new life, a life of selfless giving, of generosity of spirit, of a dedication to truth and love - a life in Christ. "I am the way, the truth and the life." (John 14:6). The account of the two disciples who were joined by the risen Christ on the road to the town of Emmaus has the same shape as the Mass we celebrate today. Initially the two disciples fail to recognize the risen and glorified Jesus who encounters them on the road. First, Jesus explains the Scriptures to them, of how the Mosaic Law and the Prophets are about his coming to save humanity and creation, and how the Christ had to suffer and die to overcome sin and death through the blood of the new and eternal covenant. Later the two disciples explain to the Apostles how their "hearts burned" as Jesus unfolded the Scriptures to them. Having listened and gained an understanding, they invite him to join them for supper. Jesus does not impose himself on the disciples, just as he does not impose himself on us. He respects our free will. But after they insist, yearning for more precious time with him, it is at supper that they recognize Jesus at the "breaking of bread." And then suddenly he vanishes. IS NOT THIS ENTIRE ENCOUNTER LIKE **OURS WITH JESUS AT HOLY MASS?** The Mass is in two parts. In the first part, passages from Holy Scripture are proclaimed and then explained with reference to Jesus' saving mission through his incarnation, teaching, crucifixion and resurrection explained by the priest himself acting in the very person of Christ. In the second part, the Mass is a Eucharistic meal - a giving thanks meal and a sacrificial Paschal meal - where we too recognize in the consecrated Host the real presence of our Lord Jesus. Our hearts burn as we hear the word of God and then receive the Word made flesh at Holy Communion. And then after a few minutes as we leave the church, Jesus appears to have vanished and we are left feeling perhaps a little bewildered but also strengthened. It is in the Eucharist that Christians above all recognize Jesus our saviour. THAT IS WHY IT IS CRUCIAL TO ATTEND MASS EVERY WEEK ON THE LORD'S DAY. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) quotes the Vatican II document Lumen Gentium in explaining Holy Communion to be the "source and summit of the Christian life" (CCC 1324) "For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch." If you are able bodied and can get to church yet are still glued to your internet screens for Mass, or worse still if you have switched yourself off, IT'S TIME TO COME BACK TO CHRIST.
