PAPAL MESSAGE FOR WORLD DAY FOR GRANDPARENTS AND THE ELDERLY Sunday, 23 July 2023

The third World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly falls on Sunday 23 July 2023, normally the Feast of St Joachim and St Anne, the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Dear brothers and sisters!

"His mercy is from age to age" (Luke 1:50). This is the theme of the Third World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, and it takes us back to the joyful meeting between the young Mary and her elderly relative Elizabeth (cf. Lk 1:39-56). Filled with the Holy Spirit, Elizabeth addressed the Mother of God with words that, millennia later, continue to echo in our daily prayer: "Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb" (v. 42). The Holy Spirit, who had earlier descended upon Mary, prompted her to respond with the Magnificat, in which she proclaimed that the Lord's mercy is from generation to generation. That same Spirit blesses and encounter accompanies every between generations: grandparents and grandchildren, young and old. God wants young people to bring joy to the hearts of the elderly, as Mary did to Elizabeth, and gain wisdom from their experiences. Above all, the Lord wants us not to abandon the elderly or to push them to the margins of life, as tragically happens all too often in our time. We are invited to reflect on the bond that unites young and old."

REFLECTION ON TODAY'S READINGS AT MASS

When we come into this church for Sunday Mass we gather as part of a community of faithful. We seek some peace and joy. But if we stand back and grasp the perspective of history, we realize that in our quest for comfort we can lose sight of the huge battle underway between good and evil in the world. We watch films depicting superheroes who save the world time and time again. They fulfil in us a yearning for justice and right order and the victory of good over evil. But we know that life isn't like that at all. Those who do bad things prosper in this world and cause unspeakable suffering. The real superhero is our Lord Jesus, the Son of God, who out of pure love for humanity, humbled himself to become one of us and then die for us and rise from the dead to save us from sin and death. This Christ is as real as real can be. Yesterday was the feast of St Mary Magdalene, the first witness to the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Today we are called to reflect on what we have to do to prepare for our own resurrection in Christ. We can never earn it. We rely on the grace and the mercy of God. But we still have to prepare ourselves for a new life by keeping God's commandments and living the sacramental life here on earth. We ignore at our peril this spiritual battle which takes place not only between human beings but within each human being. Some human beings make themselves into the darnel weed. They lure us away from the truth and love of Christ. But there is darnel in each one of us too. "All members of the Church, including her ministers, must acknowledge that they are sinners. In everyone the weeds of sin will still be mixed with the good wheat of the Gospel until the end of time. Hence the Church gathers sinners already caught up in Christ's salvation but still on the way to holiness." (Catechism 827). The point about darnel is that it is not only slightly poisonous (like sin), but it cannot be distinguished from healthy wheat until it is fully grown and deadly. Don't sleep walk into a life of sin. Cultivate the seed of the Gospel.
