## THE WAY AHEAD FOR OUR PARISH THE NEXT STEPS

Dear Brothers and Sisters – the time has come for us to do some serious planning and fundraising in order to safeguard our parish buildings and beautify our parish to show the world that we are proud of Christ. We would be proclaiming our faith in Jesus Christ from the roof tops! It is a form of evangelisation. It is also about responsible stewardship of God's gifts. At our last parish meeting I spoke further about the formation of various parish teams so that we might work together to do God's work. I will be writing to you further about that very soon, but we need to think right away about building two teams in particular as soon as possible:

- BUILDINGS TEAM a team to advise me and help me manage the replacement of rotting windows with double glazed stained glass windows, together with the installation of PVC, soffits, fascias and gutters. We need a mix of people with both practical and artistic qualities.
- SOCIAL AND FUNDRAISING TEAM a team to run activities to help us pay for the new works and also to consider options for obtaining grants, borrowing interest-free loans from other parishes etc. This team I hope will be ready to organise a Christmas Market or Bazaar in our Hall at the beginning of December to raise money.

I would like to ask for volunteers to approach me as soon as possible. Please do help if you can in this important work. You can make a difference.

## FIRST HOLY COMMUNION 2024 THE NEXT COURSE

Applications are invited for the next First Holy Communion course which will start on the first Sunday of November (the 5<sup>th</sup>) 2023, with a briefing for parents and children in mid October. Children starting Year 3 and above at school in September 2023 are eligible to apply for the course. The course will run every Sunday after the 10 am Mass (11.15 am to 12.15 am) except during holidays and half term. Attendance at Mass is essential and obligatory and is a key part of understanding the Mass and the centrality of the Eucharist in our faith. An experienced team of catechists led my Mrs Louisa Nkohkwo will take the children through the course.

Parents will need to remain at church with the children for safeguarding purposes and in parallel a separate course will be provided for them so that they may be able to help their children in their faith.

The First Holy Communion ceremony will be on the Corpus Christi weekend: Saturday 1 June 2024 for the ceremony; Sunday 2 June for a thanksgiving Mass followed by a First Holy Communion party for the children. ## BECOME A CATHOLIC IN 2024 THE NEXT COURSE

Those who are considering becoming Catholics, or who would simply like to know a little more about Christ and his Church before committing themselves, are most welcome to join the next course. We will be following a combination of two well-established courses: the Evangelium course and the Sycamore course. Fr Peter will lead the course. We will cover among other things the nature of God, the Father, the Holy Spirit and the person and the teachings of Christ, the handing down of faith through the Church, the Bible and the Mass, and Prayer. If you are interested – or if you know of a non-Catholic who might be interested or simply wants to know more please speak to Fr Peter. The course will be begin in late September. Those who wish to become Catholics will be able to do so at Easter 2024. This is an opportunity to ask questions about our faith in a friendly atmosphere.

# REFLECTION TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS AT MASS DO WE RECOGNISE JESUS?

The Gospel passage today (Matthew 15:21-28) may seem a little disconcerting at first glance. We marvel at the persistence of this pagan Canaanite woman who is begging Jesus to save her daughter, but are perplexed by the way Christ is treating her, ignoring her and even appearing to be rude. He says that his mission is to his own people, the "lost sheep of Israel," not the pagans. Yet, we know from the prophets, the Gospel writers and the writings and actions of Paul and Peter that Christ came to bring salvation to all humanity. Paul himself is the "Apostle to the Gentiles." What is going on here?

Jesus is making a point which is of crucial importance to us today. Matthew, the Christian Jew, is at pains to tell his Jewish audience that Jesus' mission is in harmony with 2,000 years of Jewish/Abrahamic history. Jesus wants to demonstrate that first he has come to save the "lost sheep" of Israel, who had broken God's covenant, because it was the nation of Israel which had been chosen to be formed over 2,000 years eventually to take Christ to the world. The Old Covenant had not been repudiated but fulfilled in him. Jesus expects them, and us, therefore, to recognise him as our Lord and Saviour. In this Gospel passage, Jesus is impressed that a non-Jew - this pagan woman - has recognised that Jesus is Lord and "Son of David" (the Messiah). Through her persistence and prayer, she indicates that she has indeed recognised him. The passage indicates that all people, no matter their background, have the divine spark in them from the Creator which enables them to see that they are indeed made in God's image and that they can therefore recognize Christ when they encounter him. It is for us, the Christians, to ensure that they do encounter Jesus. Alas, too many of us, and the majority of baptised Catholics in the West, not only fail to bring Jesus to others, but we too have broken the covenant. Even worse, we have broken the "new and eternal covenant," the one purchased by the Christ's very own blood. The situation now is so bad that only a small percentage of baptised Catholics in the West bother to come to Mass. They have God here at Mass in front of them, can receive him personally in the Eucharist, yet they do not come to receive him. As they stay away from Mass and the Eucharist, they make up their own God, often shaped in the image and likeness of a secular culture with its questionable moral and ethical values, its encouragement of selfish excess and its aggressive rejection of reasoned debate.
