Make sure you are anointed before an operation with general anaesthetic. As for Halloween, the eve of All Saints or All Hallowes, we should be commemorating the great saints of the Church, many of whom died a martyr's death for Christ, rather than to play about with ghouls and devils in trick or treat. Perhaps next year our children can dress up as their favourite saint and we can gather together to mark the eve of this great feast.

COMMEMORATION OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED - ALL SOULS – 2 November 2023 AND NOVEMBER HOLY SOULS ENVELOPES

This is not a holy day of obligation but it is a great opportunity to pray for all those souls who are being purified in purgatory awaiting the beatific vision in heaven. Please note that there will be envelopes in the lobby if you would like us to pray for your deceased loved ones. Place a list of the deceased in the envelop and hand it in as you would a Mass intention. The envelopes will be placed in front of the Altar on the sanctuary and your loved ones will be remembered at every Mass during the month of November. FIRST LOVE GOD IN TOTAL SELF-GIVING SO THAT YOU MAY LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOUR

Very often we try to explain that the Bible is all about the history of our salvation, of how God saved us, after we had rejected him because of our sin of pride. We mention how we had plunged ourselves into a world of sin and death, our consciousness filled with fog so that we could no longer see and enjoy the company of God. The Bible is all about humanity's relationship with God and how God reached down to bring us back to him and save us from our sinfulness; how God revealed himself to us gradually over millennia, and with greater and greater intensity in the 2000 year period from Abraham to Jesus. Finally, God loved us so much that he sacrificed himself through Jesus whom he raised from the dead. And all this in order to save us from sin and death and to show us that through the example of Jesus we can rediscover the beauty which God had created in each one of us. The Scripture readings today provide the key to rediscovering that beauty: 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: You must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also,' Alas, the Jews of the Old Testament kept turning away from God; they broke the covenants God had made with them - with Abraham, Moses, David. When we talk about the Jews in this way, we are talking about ourselves today just as much. The Jewish nation are the chosen people to whom God first revealed himself as the one true God. They were given so much more than others. Yet they kept turning away. How many times have Catholics broken the covenants, and not just the covenants with Abraham, Moses and David. But the "new and eternal covenant" bought with the very blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, true God and true human. We have committed far greater sins than the Jewish people, because we have been given so much more. Today, we are still turning away from God:

-How many baptised Catholics ignore Christ in their hearts and minds, and so deprive their children?

-How many Catholics honour the Sabbath with Mass?

-How many believe that the Eucharist is in reality the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ?

-How many Catholic couples live together and yet are not married in the sight of God, ignoring the covenant of marriage? How many Catholic couples are already in a full sexual relationship before they come to the priest to marry them yet still receive Holy Communion? These are grave sins which need confession.

-How many know that in vitro fertilisation is sinful, because the medical process involves the creation of many human beings most of whom are aborted or frozen for experimentation later?

-How many have abortions? Many of the 10 million babies aborted since 1967 are children of baptised Catholics. -How many will vote for assisted suicide?

-How many Catholics care enough to live the sacramental life, or can even name the Seven Sacraments?

-How many give time to prayer, even for a few minutes? -How many Catholics know their faith well enough to explain it to friends and family?

-How many know the history of Christian witness over the last two thousand years or venerate the saints?

-How many examine their conscience daily and confess their sins? How many hold grudges and resentments? -How many perform acts of charity and mercy daily?
