Confessions: Sundays 9.15am-9.45am, Saturdays 9.45 am -10.15 am during Holy Hour, Thursdays 10.15 am -10.45 am, and after weekday Mass or by appointment.

Sacrament of Confirmation - annual course for baptised young Catholics - please apply to Fr Peter

Sacrament of Marriage - please speak to Fr Peter at least six months before the proposed wedding date.

Sacrament of Healing - It is our duty to call a priest to anoint family members in failing health. Please try to give notice if at all possible and don't leave it to the last minute. Anointing brings consolation to the dying as well as healing to the sick - all the sick, including those with mental illness. It can be administered at church, in hospital, care home, at home, indeed anywhere. And make sure you are anointed before an operation with general anaesthetic.

Sacrament of Ordination and consecration to the sacred Priesthood and Religious life - please speak to Fr Peter who will connect you with our vocations director.

NOTE: NEW LECTIONARY AND NEW SUNDAY AND DAILY MISSAL FOR PARISHIONERS

A new edition of the Lectionary, the book which contains the readings which are proclaimed at Mass. will come into use in England and Wales on the First Sunday of Advent 2024. The Lectionary will use a different translation of the Bible from the one we are using now. This will affect your current missals. If you were thinking of buying a Sunday or Daily Missal, it might be best to wait until the new edition is published (probably in October). This also means that we will no longer be able to use the current set of Sunday Mass books. We will keep you informed.

REFLECTION - DO WE TRULY LOVE GOD? OR ARE WE BUILDING OUR PERSONAL GOLDEN CALF IDOLS? THE MORE WE LOVE GOD, THE MORE WE LOVE EACH OTHER

Today the Scripture passages prompt us to ask ourselves the question: do we really love God? What if I asked you right now to make a golden calf or bullock and place it on the sanctuary. Give me your rings and golden necklaces and then on the sanctuary we will make an enormous Golden Bullock or Calf and worship it together. Or what if I asked you to go home and make a little Golden Calf there and place it in the centre of your home. Tear down the Crucifix and rejoice! **You would think I had gone crazy**. And yet, my brothers and sisters, we are all tempted to do just that as soon as we leave the church and join in with the pagans in worshipping anything but the true God. It's the same temptation that led to the original Fall, the abandoning of the true God who made us in his own image and still loves us. Many civilisations have risen and fallen building the golden calf in their laws and institutions. We are no exception.

GENERAL ELECTION SPECIAL – GUIDANCE FROM THE BISHOPS OF ENGLAND AND WALES KEY ISSUES FOR CATHOLICS TO CONSIDER WHEN VOTING – SERIES (1) PROTECTING LIFE

"Serving the Gospel of life means that the family...works to ensure that the laws and institutions of the State in no way violate the right to life, from conception to natural death, but rather protect and promote it." Pope St John Paul II, Evangelium Vitae 93 Despite advances in healthcare over the last few decades, increasing threats have developed to the life of the unborn and those who are suffering or close to the end of life. Each year, there are over 200,000 abortions in the UK. Recently, the liberalisation of abortion in the home was permitted by pills without any direct medical supervision, leading to tragic consequences for both mothers and babies. It remains the case that both disability and sex are deemed as legitimate reasons for abortion. Some disabled children can be aborted up to birth. It is possible that, in the next parliament, there will be further moves to liberalise abortion up to birth for all babies. Debates are also ongoing regarding the legalisation of assisted suicide (often called assisted dying), which, in practice, could put the sick and vulnerable at risk. Our faith offers us a more hopeful and positive view of human life - that everyone has an intrinsic value from conception to natural death and beyond to eternal life. We are called to love, care for and cherish all life as a gift from God, especially the lives of the most vulnerable. It is important that we work together to promote a society where everyone can flourish. Jesus came that we may have life and have it abundantly (see John 10:10b) and this applies to every member of society. Protecting life places responsibilities on us all as individuals, as families, wider society and Government. It is important that government, civil society and charities provide appropriate support for parents and families, especially those living with situations of difficulty at the start and end of life. High quality palliative care should be accessible through a well-funded hospice movement and home care for those nearing the end of their lives. Whilst some of these policy issues are the responsibility of government, others involve matters of conscience on which Members of Parliament will vote independently of party interest. It is therefore helpful to understand where individual candidates stand on these issues in your constituency.

Actions – What must be done:

Our life policy must protect the view that everyone has an intrinsic value from conception to natural death and beyond to eternal life.

- Members of Parliament are encouraged to challenge the legalisation of assisted suicide and euthanasia.
- Families, charities, hospices, and civil society organisations should be supported appropriately so that vulnerable individuals and their families have access to appropriate care.
- Parliament should legislate to ensure that disability cannot be given as a reason for abortion and babies diagnosed with disabilities cannot be aborted up to the point of birth.
- The government should also end the practice of medically unsupervised abortions in the home.
- Parliament should resist attempts to extend abortion limits further.

• National and local government should respond to the need to support vulnerable mothers and babies.

What you can do to help: find out your candidates' views

- Will they challenge the legalisation of assisted suicide and euthanasia?
- Will they support measures to end the practice of medically unsupervised abortions in the home?
- Will they support policies to help the most vulnerable such as those in need of palliative care?
- Will they resist attempts to extend abortion limits further?
